ooks to the future New

Significant potential

AFL's new CEO, Tony Gollin's first impression of AFL is that it is "a sophisticated and profitable organisation that has significant potential."

Mr. Gollin said, "The scope of its operation offers opportunities beyond just airport operations, it provides also air traffic management and airport security, and operates the outer island airports on behalf of the Government.

Under one entity

"Many countries have separate companies providing airports with that range of support services, but in Fiji it is all one central operation under one entity."

He said that this provides the potential for business and income growth, and he wants to make sure we unlock this potential.

He believes that a key part of unlocking this potential is through the positive engagement of all AFL staff.

An enthusiastic staff

"I believe we have an enthusiastic staff, and this is a big advantage. So I really want to focus on effective communication - making sure we communicate well both up and down. If we think there are smarter ways of doing things based on staff input, we should introduce changes in a very structured way to improve current business processes."

Mr. Gollin said that involving the staff and empowering them to be a part of the business improvement process is essential.

"The airport is a service industry and the staff are absolutely critical to this service provision. They are the front face of the company, the first and last impression of the country, and they very much must be part of any service improvements."

World leading airport

Mr. Gollin turned to the possibility of Nadi International being one of the world's leading airports for its size.

"I think that it is good to aspire to that vision, and to do so we must find ways to measure AFL's performance against comparable smaller airports, particularly in the Pacific region.

He said that he would like "all of us" to fully engage time and energy to pursue the vision, and contributing to changes to achieving it.

Input in planning process

He said that there is much to do, and as projects develop, it is important to progressively

communicate with the staff and encourage their input in the planning process.

"So it is important that they know where we are going and how they all can participate."

He said that there are three key capital major projects planned for implementation over the next three years.

Upgrading at Nausori

There must be a progressive upgrading of Nausori Airport. First, to address the safety issues, he said, then to eventually look at the operational capacity that will allow bigger planes to operate over 24 hours with better terminal facilities and sufficient runway capacity.

Secondly, the Nadi international terminal needs to be refurbished internally to improve the arrival and departure experience for passengers, improve the retail presentation, and generally to make the building more functional for all stakeholders.

More attractive environment

"We also plan to create a more attractive environment reflecting and reinforcing the Fijian experience that we want to promote."

Thirdly, he said, that AFL is looking at investments at the outer-island airports. Not only to make them safer operationally but also to improve the presentation and functionality of the terminal facilities to better reflect the cultural beauty of Fiji.

WITH the launching of the newly refurbished Vodafone shop in the Nadi International arrival concourse recently, AFL continues its focus on increasing the shopping experience for its passengers.

Much of the work done over the past year has been cosmetic to improve the image of the airport. Public areas now feature photographic blowups of flowers, reef, and scenic beauty that reflect much of the country.

Vodafone has joined
ANZ Bank in upgrading
its premises in the latest
concessionaire developments,

while Jacks is the latest shop to have opened in the terminal.

With more than one million passengers using the airport, AFL will continue to explore ways to expand and enhance the shopping and dining experience as a major source of income for the company.

The Vodafone shop was refurbished at a cost of \$200,000. The shop offers access to both rentals and new mobile phones. It encourages the use of mobile phones in Fiji by offering passengers free SIM cards that can be used in Fiji while they are on vacation.

Guardforce wins AFL security contract

SECURITY company Guardforce has been awarded the AFL security contract for the next three years.

In their successful tender against four other security companies, Guardforce was the only one that met the stringent security requirements set by the International Civil Aviation Organisation [ICAO] Security Programme, as well as those of the National Civil Aviation Security Programme, authorised by CAAF, on behalf of the

Government.

Responsible for the security and safety of the passengers that arrive at and leave from Nadi International Airport, security officers employed by Guardforce must also qualify under the ICAO and the CAAF security programmes. They have to pass relevant security courses, monthly and annual audits, and also pass a Screener's Test.

Guardforce has already successfully completed a three year contract with AFL.

Assess safety lessons with GRIP

ALTHOUGH CAAF has yet to release the investigation results, there are immediate lessons that AFL can learn from recent incidents involving small aircraft at the Lakeba and Nadi Airports, by using the GRIP model said AFL's Manager, Safety and Risk Management, Ms Molly Murphy. The GRIP model is:

- Goals: For AFL, this means ensuring safe airport operations. For example, the shoulders that abut the Nadi Airport runway are designed to take the weight of an aircraft and so help mitigate the consequences of any runway related incidents.
- Roles and Responsibilities:
 These include providing
 Air Navigation Services,
 Aerodrome and Ground
 Aids, Emergency Response,
 and Compliance with all

- statutory standards.
- Interrelationships: This
 means being aware of
 the mix of air traffic that
 occurs around an airport.
 At Lakeba, AFL has been
 proactive in ensuring that all
 stakeholders are aware of
 what could go wrong, and
 that mitigation strategies are
 in place.
- Processes and Procedures: This means having proactive emergency response procedures in place, and ensuring that there is ongoing training and practice, "which is just as important for seasoned operators as it is for people just entering the aviation industry, so that everyone is fully conversant with their roles, and to avoid any complacency," said Ms Murphy.

Cicia, a jewel in Northern Lau

WITH the construction of the Airport on the Western side of Cicia in 1979, traveling to this 34 square-kilometre jewel set in the Northern Lau Group has been made far easier.

The runway, 920 metres long, by 23 wide, lies within the 88,000 square-metre Cicia Airport compound, on land that belongs to the Tui Tarukua of Tarukua Village.

Two men from his village, Kameli Cama (Team Leader) and his assistant, Timoci Talei, are responsible for the upkeep of the compound, ensuring that grass is kept mown and that there are no animals or other obstacles on or near the runway.

Approximately 20 people make

use of the weekly flight to and from Cicia, the main passengers being Government employees and officials, as well as the island's inhabitants and those of neighbouring Nayau Island.

Volcanic in origin, the island is home to about 4,000 people who live in its five villages. As well as having coastal coconut and pine trees, Cicia's interior is open grassland.

The extensive stands of coconut palms means that copra is the main source of income.

The country's third Bio-fuel plant, on Cicia, is also making use of the island's coconut harvest, since its opening in September this year by the Honourable Prime Minister.

"WE have set ourselves a goal of being the centre of excellence in aviation training for Fiji and the smaller regional countries, and from what I see today, and with the Academy Business Plan, I am confident that we are well positioned to become just that."

Mr. Tony Gollin, the new Chief Executive Officer of AFL, was speaking during the graduation ceremonies for eleven cadets who had passed their Air Traffic Controllers Basic Course held at the AFL Aviation Academy recently.

After three months 'onthe-job' training in the Nadi Control Centre and the Nadi Control Tower, graduates will be expected to perform Flight Data Officer duties, and assist Air Traffic Controllers for a year.

In thanking lecturers and staff of the Aviation Academy, AFL, the Department of Meteorology and the Civil Aviation Authority of Fiji (CAAF), Mr Gollin said that the support of CAAF in particular, highlights the need for the AFL Academy training programmes to be closely aligned with statutory requirements.

"Other regional states have recognised our ability to train Air Traffic Controllers and other operational support staff. AFL is now ready to share our wealth of knowledge in Air Traffic Control Management with our neighboring states, by welcoming their officers to be trained at the AFL Aviation Academy," said Mr Gollin.

Olympic winner, Ms Shane Gould

NADI Community Hospital will benefit from a major fundraising initiative through its perpetual trust, Project Bula Mai that will take place on December 3.

Ms. Gould will open an Olympic regulation 25 metre, five lane swimming pool, that will not only service those living in the 186 housing estate, but will be available to young aspirants who would like to follow in Shane Gould's footsteps.
